## **Introduction**

## **Course structure**

L3 Applied Diploma in Criminology is the equivalent of 1 A Level, and you would study 2 other A Level subjects alongside it. It is graded in the same way as A level (A -E) and has the same tariff points for university as an A Level. You will be assessed over the course of 2 years. In both years you will complete a course work module and sit an exam.

You will gain an insight into the criminal justice system and the role of punishment and social control. Whilst looking at how the media influences criminal behaviour and people's understanding of crime, you will create your own campaign relating to crime reduction.

### **Year 2**

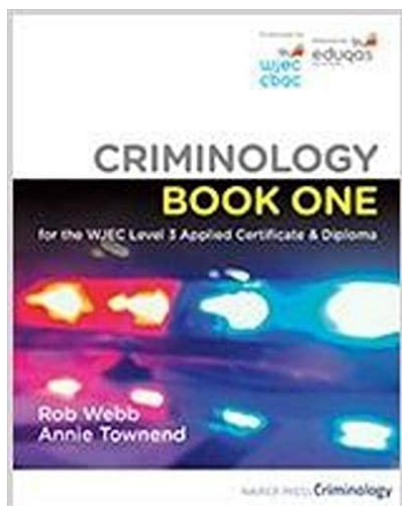
Unit 3: Crime Scene to Courtroom (coursework)

Unit 4: Crime and Punishment (exam)

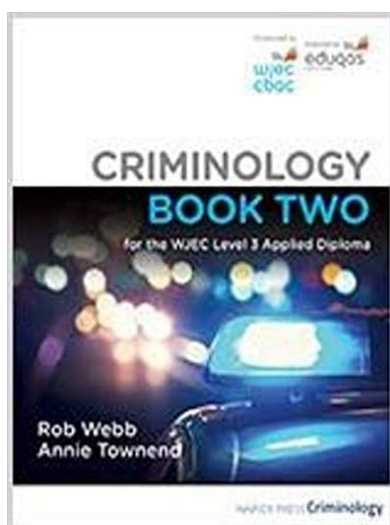
## Resources:
